Mayor's Office Updates (Nicole Cuellar – Nelson): General CAP plan open for feedback.

Measure C Updates (Steve Cohn): SMART is working with a couple of people for cleaner city measures. The idea is not just transportation but a cleaner city and climate plan. The Clean City Measures include clean streets, affordable housing, active transportation and transit, funding for climate and housing. We have not come up with countywide measures that focus on housing and streets and not on highway improvements. We need to take action for the right county-wide measures. We will be using measures similar to the SacMoves proposal framework that was put together 3 years ago in 2020. We will take advantage of the “Green Means Go” Program to develop a similar affordable housing infrastructure. It would target at least 50% of funds to disadvantaged communities, climate change plans, there are existing documents and plans admitted through the community to develop base for measure. Would set aside Green Means Go fund, and a climate fund such as a tree canopy plan to help mitigate). We need 2/3 of the votes for this initiative. We are in discussions to consider affordable housing measures we may want to collaborate with on a poll or potentially collaborating on a county-wide poll.

Dan Allison commented that he looked at the document and it looks good; we like the ideas in it.

Kevin Bewsey commented that we will be utilizing polling from a third party. Steve Cohn mentioned that we can include a few questions in it but isn't sure if we should use a different one.

2030/2045 Updates (Chris Brown): Beginning in 20s an international campaign for climate plan was introduced but not all nations were following with the Paris Climate Plan, therefore multiple other climate emergency plans were introduced. 62 governments in California joined the “climate emergency plan”, SMUD by far is the lead. Other organizations are Sac County, Sac City, YOLO, Chico, and Davis. Climate is changing much more rapidly than previously mentioned by science. The idea behind “climate emergency” is to implement climate plans more quickly. The county planning staff introduced the plan – 135 emails were sent, more than 50 were in the rally meeting. The climate action plan agenda was modified to speed it up. Staff required to give 5-year updates on plan. Staff go back, rewrite, do not replace 2030 with 2045, instead come up with 2 versions, one for each year by the end of September/early October. Thank you to Kennedy for showing the leadership and reminding everyone why the plan was made with

the 2030 deadline. Invite will be issued to any CBO to give 1 recommendation of a program that could be moved more rapidly, with 5 minutes to explain why. If you'd like to be part of the meeting with supervisors to talk to them, please put your name in the chat, will be notified around campaign to be in task force.

Measure A Update (Kevin Bewsey): SacRT will put a grant for \$2 million and STA nominates and fund SacRT. There are contracts with SacRT for the shuttle grant program. There will be shuttle for farmer's markets. Need to get the MOUs.

Coalition Letters (Deb): Are there any thoughts for SacMoves to writing letters for the climate plan update? We can create subcommittees to work on the letter to launch. We will ask everyone to sign before sending it out.

Chris Brown says it's a great idea. Would be great for SacMoves to do LOS again. August 29th Comments to City Council that we want to invest more in active transit and transportation.

Sacramento Metro Air District & Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Program - SMAQMD & SACOG presenters: SMAQMD is leading a regional effort to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, with a grant from the US EPA's Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Program. Once developed, their regional Climate Action Plan will enable our 7-county region to receive major funding from last year's federal Inflation Reduction Act (IRA). The goals include reducing vehicle miles traveled as part of SACOG's "Green Means Go", promoting energy production and energy

efficiency with SMUD, establishing mobility hubs in disadvantaged communities, improving water efficiency, managing forests, and mitigating urban heat islands. ECOS Zoom link:
